**About Youth Excel:** The USAID Youth Excel: Our Knowledge Leading Change program implemented by IREX and its consortium supports young leaders and youth-led and youth-serving organizations around the globe to conduct quality “research-to-change” (implementation research); use data and learnings to improve their own cross-sectoral, positive youth development programs; synthesize data and learning; and engage in intergenerational dialogue with adult decision-makers so that together youth and adults can shape and advance data-informed development policies, agendas, and programs.

**About the USAID Office for Gender Equality and Women’s Empowerment (GenDev):**

USAID works to improve the lives of people around the world by addressing the distinct and intersectional needs of women and girls, men and boys, in all their diversity, in our development and humanitarian work, as well as the norms and systems that hinder optimal outcomes. Identifying and addressing restrictive gender norms and inequalities helps to foster the sustainability of results. USAID has a long-standing commitment to prevent and respond to gender-based violence (GBV), promote women’s economic empowerment, promote gender equity in climate change mitigation, empower adolescent girls, engage men and boys and address gender norms, and support underserved and marginalized populations. For societies to thrive, all people must have equal rights, exercise their own voice, and live free from intimidation, harassment, discrimination and violence.

**What is “research-to-change” (implementation research)?**

Information is a powerful resource that can be used to help organizations grow and make their programs work better. “Research-to-Change” (implementation research) allows for organizations to gather data as they implement a program, take what they learn, and turn it into what they do as they adjust and adapt their program in real-time.<sup>1</sup>

**What is positive youth development?**

[Positive youth development](#) engages youth along with their families, communities, and/or governments so that youth are empowered to reach their full potential. Youth Excel works from the assumption that to contribute to healthy, productive, and engaged youth, positive youth development programs must focus on strengthening youth assets, youth agency, youth contribution, and the surrounding enabling environment.

**What is GESI?**

Gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) is an approach that helps us to understand the importance of equal rights and opportunities for all individuals regardless of their social identity. This concept addresses unequal power relations between different social groups that cause exclusion.

**What is protection?**

The protection approach helps us to understand and prepare for protection concerns related to Youth Excel, which can be digital, physical and psychosocial. Considering protection helps us to take local protection measures to prevent, mitigate and respond to risks and threats that Youth Excel can unintentionally exacerbate (risks associated with programs, operations, and people). Youth Excel aims to

understand the specific risks, but also the protection capacities, the available resources and the right to protection of participants.

### **What is knowledge mobilization?**

Knowledge mobilization is the strategic dissemination of knowledge products with a focus in driving change through the dissemination of information and data that are the result of different research and learning activities and are made openly available to the public for further use, re-use or re-distribution.

**About the grant competition:** As a [USAID New Partnerships Initiative](#) award, Youth Excel conducts grant competitions to offer funding opportunities for local organizations **to test and adapt solutions for a problem in a regional context through youth-led “research-to-change” (implementation research) approaches** for positive youth development.

Through this grant competition, Youth Excel seeks concepts to strengthen menstrual health and hygiene management for girl’s education in Malawi and Zambia. Menstrual health and hygiene management (MHH) is a critical aspect of addressing gender equality and women’s and girls’ empowerment, as it alleviates barriers to full and equal participation in education and public life. USAID has a long history of investing in MHH at schools as a water and sanitation (WASH) sector activity, in line with the Water for the World Act and the U.S. Global Water Strategy. Access to appropriate MHH as part of WASH facilities and services is also reflected in the USAID Education Policy and the U.S. Government Basic Education Strategy.

This grant competition will fund youth-led and youth-serving organizations who have existing school-based MHH programs within schools that serve adolescent girls and have existing WASH/latrine infrastructure. Grantees will self-identify implementation research questions that align with the linkages between MHH and educational outcomes.

Activities must focus on school-based interventions and/or school-based interventions complemented with community-based interventions, and may include education/awareness raising, services provision for students and teachers, product provision, or a combination thereof. Educational outcomes explored may include but are not limited to school attendance, retention, and/or intended persistence; student achievement; parental support for education; teacher capacity to support girls’ education; socio-emotional learning; etc.

Youth Excel will fund organizations currently implementing a donor-funded project or program that addresses menstrual health hygiene and management for girl’s education. Applicants are encouraged to leverage other ongoing investments in girls’ education, such as schools supported by USAID’s Secondary Education Expansion for Development (SEED) program in Malawi or schools supported by USAID/PEPFAR DREAMS programming in Zambia. Youth Excel funding will enable you to add research and learning activities to your existing program to make the program better.

Youth Excel is interested in funding local youth-led and youth-serving organizations to better understand and address youth priorities for this problem in this region.

*Issuance of this request for concept notes does not constitute an award commitment on the part of Youth Excel, nor does it commit Youth Excel, IREX, or USAID to pay for costs incurred in the preparation and submission of an application. The application is submitted at the risk of the applicant. All preparation and submission costs are at the applicant's expense.*

## **I. What kind of grants are available?**

- **Purpose:** using “research-to-change” (implementation research) to strengthen menstrual health hygiene and management for girl’s education in East and Southern Africa
- **Locations:** Malawi and Zambia.
- **Number:** 4-5. *Subject to the availability of funds, Youth Excel reserves the right to fund any or none of the applications submitted.*
- **Type:** Fixed amount subaward. Payments based on the negotiated budget will be made upon successful completion of project milestones. [ADS Reference 303mat](#) *Mandatory Standard Provisions for Fixed Amount Awards to Nongovernmental Organizations apply.*
- **Amount:** USD \$40,000 - \$50,000. Applicants can propose the amount required for project implementation within this range. *Cost share is not required.*
- **Start:** July 2022.
- **Length:** 8 months.

## 2. Who can apply to the grant competition?

Local youth-led and youth-serving organizations serving youth aged 10-24 who meet the following minimum criteria and share Youth Excel objectives are eligible to apply. Organizations led by or serving marginalized groups, which may include age, gender, disability, ethnicity, and other identities, are encouraged to apply. The grant competition is not restricted to certain technical sectors or to research organizations.

### 4. How will applicants be selected to receive funding?

1. **Eligibility screening:** IREX will conduct an initial review of the concept note, based on the following criteria for responses to Parts A and D, and disqualify applicants and concept notes that are not eligible for consideration.
  - ✓ Does concept note satisfy the basic parameters? [Refer to Section 1]
  - ✓ Does applicant meet the minimum eligibility criteria? [Refer to Section 2]
  - ✓ Is concept note complete and submitted on time? [Refer to Section 3]
2. **Participatory selection:** Youth Excel seeks partners interested in collaborating and sharing knowledge with each other and stakeholders through learning events and data summits during project implementation. Youth Excel is also committed to participatory grant-making in which those people who are most impacted participate in decision-making. In order to build the foundation for open exchange during the grant competition phase, eligible applicants will provide feedback on each other's concept notes.

Eligible applicants will be invited to an optional participatory selection workshop on **April 12<sup>th</sup>, 2022 at 2:30-4 pm CAT** to give input on the grant competition process and criteria. *Participating applicants will be required to submit a signed consent to share concept note, confidentiality, and conflict of interest statement and complete a conflict of interest declaration if any arise during participatory selection.*

Eligible applicants participating in the workshop will be invited to review 3 concept notes by **April 19<sup>th</sup>, 2022 at 11:59 pm CAT** based on the following criteria for responses to Part B. Questions 1-9 related to concept design:

- ✓ Does applicant clearly identify and demonstrate understanding of the problem that the concept will address? [Question 4]
- ✓ To what extent does the proposed solution address the problem in a realistic, meaningful, and innovative way? [Question 5]
- ✓ Does applicant articulate its motivation and priority for the concept? [Question 6]
- ✓ Does applicant demonstrate clear understanding of the context, informed by preliminary gender equality and social inclusion analysis? Does applicant describe how it will adapt the concept to be effective in the context? Will the applicant leverage any ongoing investments in girls' education in the context? [Question 7]
- ✓ Is the concept inclusive of youth and marginalized group(s)? Is the concept and approach responsive to youth priorities? Does applicant display understanding of risks and demonstrate safeguarding measures to ensure the concept does no more harm? [Question 8]
- ✓ Are applicants aware of potential risks for participants and are they considering of mitigation strategies? [Question 9]

Participating applicants will provide an overall assessment of each concept note with brief comments that will be shared with the applicant.

Concept notes that are “strongly recommended” or “recommended” will receive an extra round of review by Youth Excel taking into account participatory selection feedback. However, concept note scoring will not be negatively impacted by optional participation or feedback from the participatory selection process in any way. Youth Excel reserves the right to make final decisions based on the selection criteria about which applicants will advance in the grant competition.

3. **Youth Excel review:** The shortlisting and review panel, comprised of selected Youth Excel consortium, Global Youth Advisory Council, and USAID members, will use the same criteria for responses to Part B, Questions 1-9 to assess the concept design, as well as the following criteria for Part B, Question 10 and Part C to assess capacity:
  - ✓ Is the concept feasible for the applicant to implement within the proposed timeframe and funding amount? Does the applicant display the technical expertise needed for the proposed approach? Does the applicant demonstrate fundamental technical and financial management systems and capacity through a track record of successful implementation of projects of similar size and scope? [Part B, Question 10 and Part C]

The panel will rate concept notes on the following criteria:

- ✓ **Responsiveness:** concept’s approach and value for youth priorities related to the grant competition theme and region. [Part B, Questions 1-9; informed by participatory selection review]
- ✓ **Feasibility:** applicant’s understanding of requirements and proven capacity to successfully implement the concept. [Part B, Question 10 and Part C]
- ✓ **Impact:** concept’s potential to advance positive youth development outcomes and learning. [Overall]
- ✓ **Protection:** applicant’s awareness of potential risks for participating youth and consideration of mitigation strategies [Question 9]
- ✓ **Inclusion:** applicant’s commitment to diversity and inclusion (especially regarding work with and/or support to vulnerable or marginalized groups such as girls and women, youth with disabilities, youth from ethnic or religious minorities, and other identities)[Overall]

Semifinalists selected by the panel will be invited to submit a full application.
